





2018 Visitation as a Baseline & Adaptive Management to Adjust Strategies Over Time

 Transit approach could accommodate a 5% increase over 2018 visitation, basinwide strategy needed to address displaced visitation or additional funds and infrastructure needed for transit and to address visitation impacts.
